

Definition

The literary museum (whether it is a public or private collection) is open to the public, explores and collects literary heritage (tangible and intangible) as well as presents and transfers classical and contemporary literature to generations of audiences from a multifaceted perspective in order to support and strengthen the linguistic and cultural identity that welcomes the diversity of cultures in the world.

The literary museum is a memory institution appreciated by the society as it maintains and continuously enriches cultural memory and identity by developing the relations between people and their heritage through providing opportunities for personal and community experiences of the dialogue between literature and other arts.

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
